The Chattanooga Chapter was invited to present its documentary, "Balancing the Scales: The Chattanooga Trial of *U.S. v. James R. Hoffa*", as part of the program during the Sixth Circuit's Judicial Conference held in Chattanooga in May. The presentation illustrated key ethical considerations that arise during high-profile trials and included a CLE program, video clips, and a panel discussion. The documentary was shown in the actual courtroom in which Hoffa's trial took place.

For the documentary, the chapter obtained interviews with many figures involved in the trials: prominent Nashville attorney, James F. Neal, who is a former assistant U.S. attorney and was the prosecutor in both the Nashville and Chattanooga trials of Hoffa; Chattanooga attorney, Marvin Berke, a member of Hoffa's local defense team; Chattanooga attorney, Charles Gearhiser, former law clerk to Hon. Frank W. Wilson, who presided over the trial in Chattanooga; Pat Haverty, the last surviving juror from the trial; Harry Mansfield, former U.S. marshal; John Seigenthaler Sr., a well-known jour-

nalist, former newspaper editor, and one-time assistant to Attorney General Robert F. ### **Inland Empire**

On July 31, the Inland Empire Chapter held a lunchtime presentation in which the panelists discussed California's medical marijuana laws. Featured speakers at the presentation, titled "Medical Marijuana: Legal Issues for Civil and Criminal Practitioners," were Marc Erlich, an attorney with Best, Best & Krieger; M. Allen Hopper of the American Civil Liberties Union; Michael Johnsen of the Office of the California Attorney General, and Robert Stacy from the U.S. Attorney's Office

and member of the board of directors of the FBA Inland Empire Chapter. The speakers discussed the types of conduct that are permitted and prohibited under California's medical marijuana laws and how California law interacts with federal legislation generally prohibiting the sale and possession of marijuana. The panel also addressed the concerns not just of individuals seeking marijuana for medicinal purposes but also of other entities, who often find themselves caught between seemingly contradictory federal and state laws, such as municipalities and landlords. The audience was enthusiastic, and the speakers took questions from attendees long after the allotted time. **TFL**
