When, how and whether a person can become a citizen of a country is extremely significant in these global times. The subject of citizenship is rich with possibility. Some people have access to citizenship of multiple countries, while others are stateless. In Europe, many enjoy citizenship of their country of nationality and may have citizenship-like rights of employment and settlement in other EU member countries. Some countries allow dual and multiple citizenships. Others require a single allegiance.

Citizenship is treated frequently as an immigration issue, but it is far more, going to questions of civic responsibility and body politic. Who can vote for candidates, who is eligible for benefits, and who owes what in taxes often turns on citizenship. Many focus on the benefits of citizenship, but there are also responsibilities. What are the obligations of corporate citizens and multinational corporations? What are the implications of technology in citizenship jurisprudence?

This conference will explore citizenship and nationality questions in various contexts. Europe withstood cataclysmic changes during the

20th century. In transcontinental Turkey, a forced population exchange linked citizenship and nationality with religion. From the Balkans to the Baltics, the failure of communism had significant citizenship implications in Eastern Europe as states with new governments emerged. In the Americas, the establishment of citizenship and the rights of indigenous people has had an uneasy history and continues to have an impact even today. International adoption and surrogacy are making their mark on citizenship and nationality principles, including cultural identity. A country without the rule of law renders citizenship valueless.

These issues will be addressed in the beautiful Palazzo Antici Mattei, home of the Centro di Studi Americani. We will all gather the day before the conference for an evening meal in Trastevere. After the conference, we will enjoy antipasto and wine at a reception on a terrace overlooking the domes of Rome.

CITIZENSHIP CONSIDERATIONS WITH INTERNATIONAL ADOPTIONS AND SURROGACY

The Hague Adoption Convention, an international agreement to safeguard inter-country adoptions, prohibits abduction, sale of, or trafficking in children. This panel will discuss the Convention, and how international adoptions and surrogacy relationships are impacted by citizenship and nationality policies and cultural identity concerns. They will review how jus soli (right of soil) and jus sanguinis (right of blood) principles of nationality affect these children.

CITIZENSHIP ISSUES IN 20TH CENTURY EASTERN EUROPE

During the 20th century, citizenship and nationality were transformed dramatically all over the world. Europe withstood cataclysmic changes. This panel will focus on citizenship issues in Eastern Europe, from the dissolution of the Ottoman Empire and a massive population exchange, to the end of Communism and the building of new governments. INDIGENOUS PEOPLE AND CITIZENSHIP RIGHTS

Citizenship is an evolving concept when one state is overtaken by another, or a new state is established by a new group. EXCLUSIVE CITIZENSHIP DOCTRINES

This panel will review situations where a government or a body politic requires exclusive allegiance to a single state. In the modern world, demands for exclusivity of citizenship can create conflicts, as when a person automatically acquires citizenship in a country that will not permit relinquishment. Moreover, sometimes people present in a territory are accorded citizenship but do not have the same level of representation as “full” citizens of a nation-state.

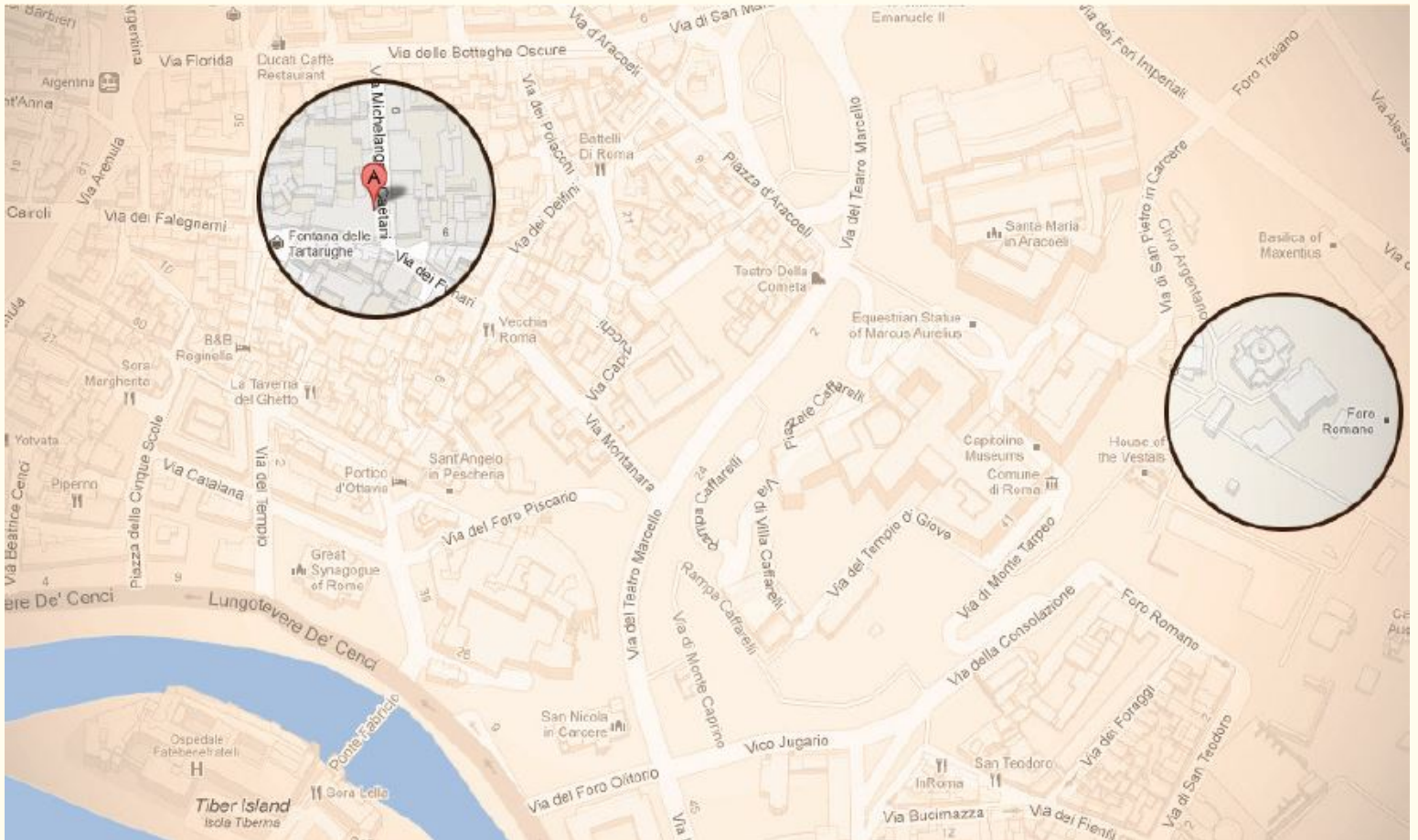
